Cyrus Updike, living in the south part of this town, was attacked by this large bull, last week, and quite seriously injured. The bull gored him in the leg and pitched him over the fence. The animal was promptly butchered.
By a mistake of the architect the tower of the new school building when about half way up had to be torn down and rebuilt stronger. It caused some delay and considerable expense to the tax payers.
The union meeting, next Sunday evening, will be at the Baptist church. The huckleberry crop is turning out somewhat short. They bring 9 cts. per quart. Fifty to seventy-five bushels a day are shipped from here at present.
Threshing has begun in all directions and wheat turns out well and is of good quality but in many cases badly mixed with smut balls.

Some new wheat has been bought here at 85 cts for red and 88 cts. for white. Old wheat would bring 92 to 94 cts; rye brings 60 cts.; oats, 35 cts. barley, \$1.20 per hundred. Potatoes, 60 to 65 cts.; eggs, 15 cts.; butter 14 cts. Wool continues to come in slowly at 20 to 25 cts. per pound.

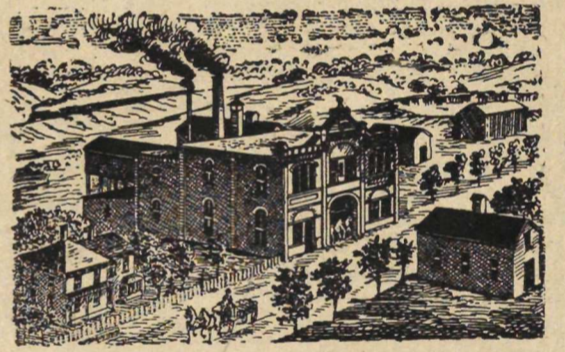
