William McKinley, of Ohio, is the logical republican candidate for president. His recent great victory in Ohio will go far towards making him the candidate in '96. But with him on the republican ticket, democrats ought to win. He stands for high tariff or in other words for high taxes and the people of this country have had enough of high taxes.

The Protectionist snake was scorched, not killed, by the land-slides of 1890 and 1892. The Republican party, though greatly reduced in effective strength, is still potent for mischief, compactly organized and led by astute politicians. The business panic, the stagnation that followed, the inaction and resentment of the disgruntled and disgruntled and disappointed expectant, the disgust of intelligent and independent voters over the incompetency and senility of the Senate, have stayed for a moment the flow of the Democratic tide. But, if Democrats are brave and wise, it will be only for a time.

Under the patriotic, sagacious and firm leadership of the Democratic administration, Congress has the opportunity to recover all that is lost; and then, with the revival of trade, and good crops, the ices of next November will bring us tidings of exceeding great joy, confirming, and not reversing, the verdict of the country when it elected Grover Cleveland president.

In a party point of view the prompt passage of a tariff bill is of the greatest importance. The Congressional elections come on in November, 1894, and the new tariff bill should have a fair trial before that date, in order that the people may have an opportunity to realize beneficent effects. The experience of the Republicans with the McKinley bill should not be lost upon the Democrats. That bill was approved by the President October 1, 1890, and by its terms took effect, when not otherwise specially provided, on October 6. That was just a month before the Congressional elections, at which the Republicans met a most disastrous overthrow. The bill was so bad that it would, no doubt, have led to Republican defeat in any event; but politicians are generally agreed that it was a stupendous blunder to make it take effect in so short a time before an important election. The disturbance to business was naturally more apparent before the country had had time to adjust itself to the new rates. The contention of the Republicans that this was the sole cause of the popular uprising was falsified by the result of the elections two years later; but it is certain that it had its effect.

If the Democrats are wise they will not repeat that blunder. Tariff reform must be pushed with all possible expedition. Such a course is demanded alike by the interests of the country and by considerations of party expediency.

A Certain Kind of Boy.

I am always sorry to see a boy get angry, pack up a tooth-brush and a shirt, and leave his home. His chances for the future are a little doubtful. It is hard to prognosticate whether he will fracture limestone in the streets of a great city or become President of the United States.

whether he should marry and live with his parents or with his father-in-law, he finally settles the matter and compromises by living alternately with each.

He is no good. He is certainly no good. His parents do not yearn to see him, he comes, just the same, as regular as a boil. He hangs around home and eats other peoples groceries and borrows other people's newspapers, and sits on the counter of the store until the owner calls him a counter-irritant.

There is nothing in the world more un-American than this one horse barnacle on the clam shell of home. The average American would rather bust up in business six times in four years and settle for nine cents on the dollar, than lead such a life. He is not an American, but he is a wart on the face of nature, and I will not lay his existence on any other country.

But he will not last long. He will soon be strolling through the corridors of the sweet subsequently. He will breath a certain amount of atmosphere for a while, but one day the undertaker will buy a new pair of black gloves, come and get him, carefully place him in a nail keg, and convey him in a dray to the crematoire. That will be all. There will be no deep abiding sorrow for him here: public buildings will not be draped in black, the flag on the court-house will still float at the top of the staff, and you can get your mail at the usual time. The band will not play sadly because this tail end of a misspent life has tapered down to death, and the soft shapeless features are still. You will have no trouble getting a draft cashed on that day, and we will all go to Whitmore Lake as we had planned.

Editor Argus: The above aggregation of words appearing in a column headed "Wit and Humor," or "Sparks of Nonsense," would be incongruity; but when it is known that it occupies a place in the editorials, the case is quite different.

From the day of the first issue of the Times, the self-confident manner of speech with which leaders of thought in the United States and elsewhere have been criticized and the assumption of omniscience manifested by the editor in calling attention to what "Mr. Gladstone seems to forget;" and "Mr. Depew overlooks" and in assuring the people that "Congress has at last adopted the plan suggested by the Times some days ago," has been quite unbecoming a country newspaper: but the lines quoted above are too ludicrous to be allowed to pass unnoticed.

The editor would have his readers believe that the founders of the American colonies and the United States of America were aliens, and that for that reason, we their progeny are estopped to deprecate the conduct of aliens in Hawaii in "usurping the rights of a native population."

The American colonies were founded upon hitherto ungoverned territory; the uncivilized natives were conciliated or subdued as the necessities or organized government seemed to require; the result was conquest of a savage race. And it is doubtful whether any reader of the Times will see the slightest resemblance between this case and the attempt by a self-appointed committee of public safety, so called, consisting of thirteen men, five of whom owe allegiance to the United States of America, living in a distant island of the sea, having the opportunity of a momentary discontent among the people, and being assured of the concurrence and assistance of the American minister and the United States navy to overthrow the established constitutional government of Hawaii, which, so far as any legal expression of the popular will has been had, is perfectly satisfactory to the government, and, by an array of naval forces, to overawe the Queen and force her to yield for a time her scepter, and then, with no authority whatever, except the desire of a provisional government, whose very name indicates its lack of power to barter away the nation, to post away in haste and offer freely as a gift to

the United States, the whole kingdom of Hawaii, imploring the Chief Executive, in the name of a martyred people for whom it pretends to speak, to annex and protect the territory. Yet the Times would have us believe that the cases are identical.

Let the editor descend from the lofty eminence of his cosmopolitan wisdom and statesmanship and tell us of matters nearer home and more certainly within his reach.
