The first gun of the democratic campaign of 1896 was fired at Louisville on Wednesday. The engagement resulted in the utter rout of the advocates of free silver.

The victory has a significance and political bearing extending far beyond the bounds of the blue grass state. It was the first regular democratic meeting since the money question became an issue.

The results of this victory will be far reaching. It will have a greater influence than a dozen such victories as that recently held in Illinois.

The result in Kentucky shows that the movement in favor of fifty cent dollars has passed the high water mark and is now on the decline.

SHOOTING TO KILL.

Deadly Three-Cornered Affray at South End, O. T.

TWO OF THE PARTICIPANTS FALL.

One with a Bullet Through His Lung and the Other with a Ball in His Brain—Newspaper Criticism the Cause of the Tragedy and the Editor Wounded—All the Fighters Prominent Citizens—Kidnaping Case at Buffalo.

SOUTH END, O. T., June 27.—R. W. Patterson, register of the United States land office at this place, and City Marshal Williams lie dead at the city morgue, while J. L. Isenberg, editor of The Daily Wave, is badly wounded, the result of a sensational street fight that occurred here last evening.

In the midst of the fracas Marshal Williams appeared upon the scene, when Patterson turned his gun upon him. His first shot caught Williams in the right breast, passing clean through the lung.

R. W. Patterson was a resident of Macon, Ga., before receiving his appointment here, and since coming to the territory was one of the most popular Democratic appointees within its borders.

PROMINENT LAWYER KIDNAPED.

Attempt to Extort Money Which His Abductors Fail to Get. BUFFALO, N. Y., June 27.—Octavius O. Cottle, a prominent Buffalo lawyer, was found bound and gagged in the cellar of a vacant house at Black Rock yesterday morning.

A pitcher of water was put near, so that by stooping he could reach it, and the only food given him was a few crackers. Evidently he remained while other efforts to extort money from the Cottle family were made.

Da Gama Commits Suicide.

BUENOS AYRES, June 27.—Admiral Da Gama, the noted opponent of the Brazilian republic, who besieged Rio Janeiro for months some time ago and afterward joined the rebels in Rio Grand do Sul, during a fight with the Brazilian government troops, finding his force empowered, committed suicide.

Railway To Be Extended.

MARINETTE, Wis., June 27.—It is authoritatively stated here that the Wisconsin and Michigan railway will extend its line from Fathorn Junction to Florence, Wis., a distance of twenty-five miles. This extension will tap the principal mines of the Menominee iron range, and will be near enough to the main source of the Menominee river to do considerable lumber business in connection with the car ferry route to South Chicago.

International Good Templars.

BOSTON, June 27.—The international supreme lodge of Good Templars has opened its convention in this city. Dr. D. H. Mann, R. W. G. T., presiding. Secretary B. F. Parker's report showed a loss of about 20,000 members in America, Canada and Australia, while gains had been made in Africa, India, Scandinavia, Germany, Switzerland and Great Britain.

Syndicate Closes Its Contract.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Yesterday's statement of the condition of the treasury shows: Available cash balance \$191,931,060; gold reserve, \$107,447,885. The syndicate is understood to have closed its contract for the bonds, but it is also understood to be bound to protect the treasury surplus until October next.

LONDON, June 27.—The prince of Wales and the Shazada Nazrulla Kahn dined with Hon. George Curzon and Mrs. Curzon, formerly Miss Mary Leiter, of Washington, last night. The company included a number of dukes and duchesses.
