MINNIE WILLIAMS IS ALIVE.

Holmes Received a Telegram from Her Yesterday.

MOBBED A MADMAN.

Lynch Spirit Causes Another Disgrace to Ohio.

NEGRO MURDERER HUNG TO A TREE

Victim of the Popular Judge Kills a Prominent Citizen at Noon and is Dead by 4 p. m., Notwithstanding He Was "Not Right in His Mind"—Lynching Executed on the Ground of Popular Temporary Insanity, Apparently.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 22.—At New Richmond, O., twenty-five miles up the Ohio river from Cincinnati, at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, a mob took Noah Anderson, colored, from the jail and hanged him for the murder a few hours previous of Franklin Fridman, nearly 80 years old and president of the First National bank of that place.

Choked the Old Man to Death. With these he quickly bore the aged banker to the earth and then, clutching his throat with the power of a demon, he literally choked his helpless victim to death.

Murderer Was Probably Insane. It is said that Anderson was not right in his mind, and that one of his hallucinations was that Fridman had deprived him of a large sum of money. The truth is that the two men had had no dealings together, as Anderson came to New Richmond on a shanty boat only a few months ago and claimed to be a paper hanger.

Lost Their Reason Temporarily. No sooner did the man appear outside the jail than the frenzied mob rushed at the marshal and seizing the prisoner bore him quickly to the nearest tree and in a brief time he was dead.

NOT A SUCCESSFUL ENTERPRISE.

Bandits Who Robbed the Train in Nebraska Get Only \$100 in Cash.

OMAHA, Aug. 22.—Union Pacific train No. 8, which was held up by express robbers three miles east of Brady's Island, pulled into Omaha two hours and ten minutes late. If the news of the occurrence had not preceded it the appearance of the express car was sufficient to show that something unusual had occurred.

The big safe at one side on which the dynamite had been piled was badly mangled. The top was cracked in several directions and one big rent near the center indicated the spot where the explosive had been placed.

Conductor Flynn says that the robbers undoubtedly boarded the train at Brady's Island. They laid low until the train reached the second curve in the sand hills, when they climbed over the tender and levelled their revolvers at the engineer and fireman and compelled them to stop the train.

The engineer told the messenger that they carried Winchesters and would blow the top of his head off unless the door was opened. Conductor Flynn thinks that the escape of the fireman with the engine alarmed the robbers and caused them to leave before they had completed their work.

Feud Results in Double Murder. WHITESBURG, Ky., Aug. 22.—Will Gilbert and James Owens, brothers-in-law, were killed in a hand-to-hand battle at the village of Keystone, in Mingo county, W. Va., near the Kentucky line, by James Straus. The encounter was the result of a family feud, which had its origin ten years or more ago.

The Hold-Up in Michigan. CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—Nothing further has been heard of the men who held up the Chicago and West Michigan train. The robbers have been traced to Allegan, but have not yet been captured, though the officers are confident.

Disappears with the Cash. PANA, Ills., Aug. 22.—William Bass, of Ocoee, a stockbuyer for the Fayette County bank, has disappeared with the proceeds of a sale of cattle at Chicago. The bank fears foul play.

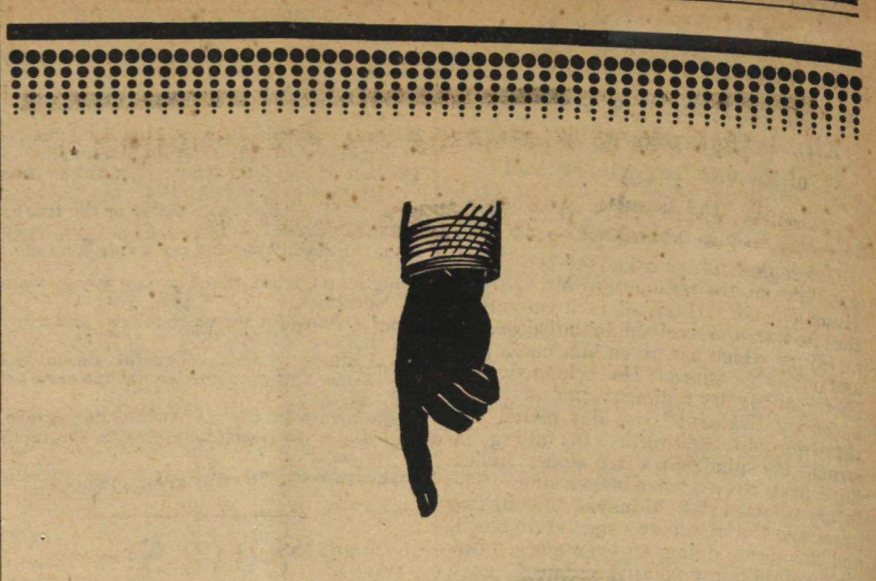
