Thousands of Cuban Pacificos Die of Hunger.

Nearly 75 Per Cent. of the 400,000 Helpless Women, Children and Non-Combatants Affected by Weyler's Policy Have Died—Spanish Troops Also Suffer Heavily—Not Half of Those Sent to Cuba Are Now Alive—Blanco in a Bad Way.

New York, Nov. 16.—A special from Havana says: It now appears that nearly 75 per cent. of the 400,000 helpless women, children and non-combatants in Cuba affected by former Captain General Weyler's policy are dead.

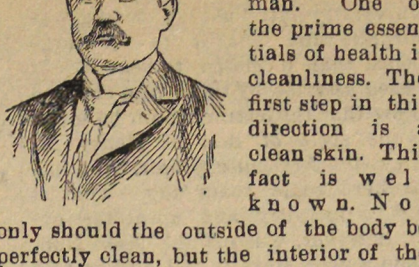
