FIVE FAVORITE SONS

Come Into Convention Here Next Wednesday.

HALF ENOUGH VOTES

The Greatest Number Any of Them Can Muster.

Spalding, Wedemeyer, Smith, Townsend and Bishop Want to Go to Congress.—Each Has His Own County Men.

The republican congressional convention meets in this city next Wednesday when a battle royal will be on. Each county will present a favorite son and nearly all the favorite sons have been angling for the Pingree influence.

The question which interests the politicians is how the various candidates can swell their votes. Townsend has endeavored to capture the Wedemeyer votes by offering to secure Wedemeyer the Jackson delegation for state senator, but Wedemeyer will hardly throw up a \$1,500 position as deputy railroad commissioner for a \$500 position as state senator, with no positive knowledge that Townsend could deliver the goods.

In Jackson county, Townsend named his own delegates, the county convention having nothing to do but to ratify Townsend's choice. The same was true in Wayne county where Bishop named the delegates.

It might be well to mention that Forts Washington, Sheridan and old Fort Foote lie between on both sides of the river. An Ann Arbor Boy Describes a Visit to Mt. Vernon.

Washington, D. C., July 5, 1898.
