To the Hon. Board of Supervisors of Washtenaw County. GENTLEMEN—Since my last annual report to you, dated October 14, 1879, I have sent ten persons to the eastern Michigan asylum for the insane, whose support will be charged to the county, as follows:

1. Charles F. Dieterle, sent on the 20th day of October, 1879, from the township of Freedom. The physicians examining the case were John Kapp and Conrad George. Wm. Dieterle is 21 years of age, and his parents reside in Germany.

2. Elizabeth Cone, sent on the 4th day of November, 1879, from the township of Lima, P. W. O'Toole, the county physician, being examined to her sanity. She is a pauper and some of her children are supported at the county house, her husband being dead.

3. Caleb Eldridge, sent on the 20th day of November, 1879, from the township of Webster. The physicians examining this case were John Kapp and W. B. Smith. Mr. Eldridge, I learn has since died.

4. Leonard D. Rosier, sent on the 20th day of January, 1880, from the township of Webster. Physicians, John Kapp and Elijah W. Cooper. All the expenses in this case have been paid by George Rosier and he has guaranteed the county against any future liability of the Leonard D. Rosier relatives on a county charge.

5. Thomas B. Whitlark, was sent from the city of Ann Arbor on the 2d day of March, 1880. Physicians examining his case J. W. Morton and W. B. Smith. Mr. Whitlark has property worth about \$1000 in hands of a trustee for the support of his family—a sick wife and one child unable to support itself.

We desire also to call the attention of your Honorable Board to the fact that the last Board of Supervisors withheld from us nearly three-fourths of the amount which, after careful examination, we estimated as necessary for the year's expenses. Of the \$3,962.61 appropriated by them, \$3,433.98 was applied to pay loans already made to close the year ending Sept. 30, 1880, leaving available for the year's expenses

\$508.63, which added to the balance in the treasury of \$127.70, and amount received from towns and cities of \$1,577.62, making a total of \$2,213.95, constituted our entire resources for the year now closed.

It is inevitable that, instead of borrowing a small amount to close the year, we had to borrow a sum equal to the whole year's expenses, less about \$2,000.

It has seemed to us that the policy of the last Board of Supervisors was a mistaken one. As the result of it, we are compelled to ask the present Board, and do ask them, to appropriate the sum needed to pay existing loans, made for the past few years, and not provided for, which amount to all of which will be due and payable on the first day of February, 1881.

This we ask you to appropriate in addition to the amounts herewith submitted for the ensuing year.
