Newspaper Decisions.

1. Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post-office—whether directed to his name or another's or whether he has subscribed or not—is responsible for the payment.

2. If a person orders his paper discontinued, lie must pay all arrearage, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment, and collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken from the office or not.

3. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of Intentions! fraud.

TWO STATE PAPERS, Gov. Jerome Makes His Exit, and Begole Comes to the Front.

In his retiring message Gov. Jerome opens with a striking contrast between the State of Michigan, 83 years ago, when the present constitution was adopted, and the condition at the present time.

FINANCIAL. The financial condition of the State is admirable, and in no other state are the taxes levied for State purposes lower than in Michigan.

The receipts of the State treasury for the past two years have been \$1,577,000, or \$344,000 in excess of the appropriation for the year.

THE BOND DEBT \$1,990,140.11 which \$500,000 fell due January 1, 1888. The trust debt of the State (the proceeds of the sales of land granted for educational purposes) and the rate of interest paid is as follows:

Primary school fund, 82,921,325 ft. Primary school fund, 5 p. c. 837,906 ft. University fund, 5 p. c. 485,601 ft. Agricultural college fund, 5 p. c. 117,550 ft. Normal school fund, 6 p. c. 60,076 ft.

Disastrous fires. In this state in the fall of 1881 destroyed 6,000 buildings, deprived 10,000 persons of their means of support, and swept away between 900 and 1,000 lives.

REVISION OF THE TAX LAWS. The tax laws of the state were very complex. They had been so amended that it was impossible to leave little certainty as to the construction to be put upon their various provisions.

SWAMP LANDS. The amount of swamp lands still belonging to the state in the lower peninsula is 25,825 acres. Some of these lands have been placed under the control of a board of control.

THE INSANE ASYLUMS. Legislation is recommended enabling Hamilton, L. A. Co., to transfer to the new asylum the insane of adjacent localities.

THE Kalamazoo asylum has been fitted with new heating apparatus. It is now capable of receiving 5,000 inmates.

THE DEAF, DUMB AND BLIND. The deaf and dumb institution is in good condition. Its capacity is 250 pupils, but it now has 300.

THE STATE ASYLUMS. The state public school at Coldwater cost \$200,000. It occupies a farm of 75 acres with a central building and nine cottages.

THE STATE TROOPS. The total number of state troops is 1,960, organized into three regiments and 15 battalions.

INSANE CRIMINALS. I think that in the vicinity of one of our asylums for the insane, but separated from it, there should be erected an asylum for insane criminals.

RAILROADS. There are 4,545 miles of road in Michigan—an increase of 1,722 miles in 10 years and 7 1/2 miles in the past five years.

INSURANCE. The Michigan Lumber Yard is a success, and justifies its creation by the Legislature. It has not only secured a very large number of intelligent emigrants from other states, but its valuable array of products and figures widely distributed throughout the state.

We have assumed the duties assigned us by the sovereign people of the State of Michigan to serve them as Legislators and I as Chief Executive.

I have had but little opportunity to examine specially and in detail the many interests for the education of the people of this State.

THE RESULTS of the recent elections in the several states have called the attention of men of all parties to the need of a reform in the civil service that shall place the holding of offices on a firmer basis and divest it of its present strictly partisan character.

THE STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL. The State Public School at Coldwater is a temporary school for the education of children of the poor, as yet untaught by crime.

THE STATE LIBRARY. The report of the Librarian for the years 1881 and 1882 in an intelligent statement of the present condition and needs of the Library, and the appropriation of \$84,000 asked for the year 1883 and 1884 is recommended.

THE STATE NORMAL SCHOOL. Our position as a border state, as well as the painful experience of the civil war, indicate that the military spirit should be fostered among us.

THE COMMONS of the State are supported wholly by the public. The taxation of a secretary at the expense of the State, I feel assured will be the means of placing much valuable information before the next Legislature.
