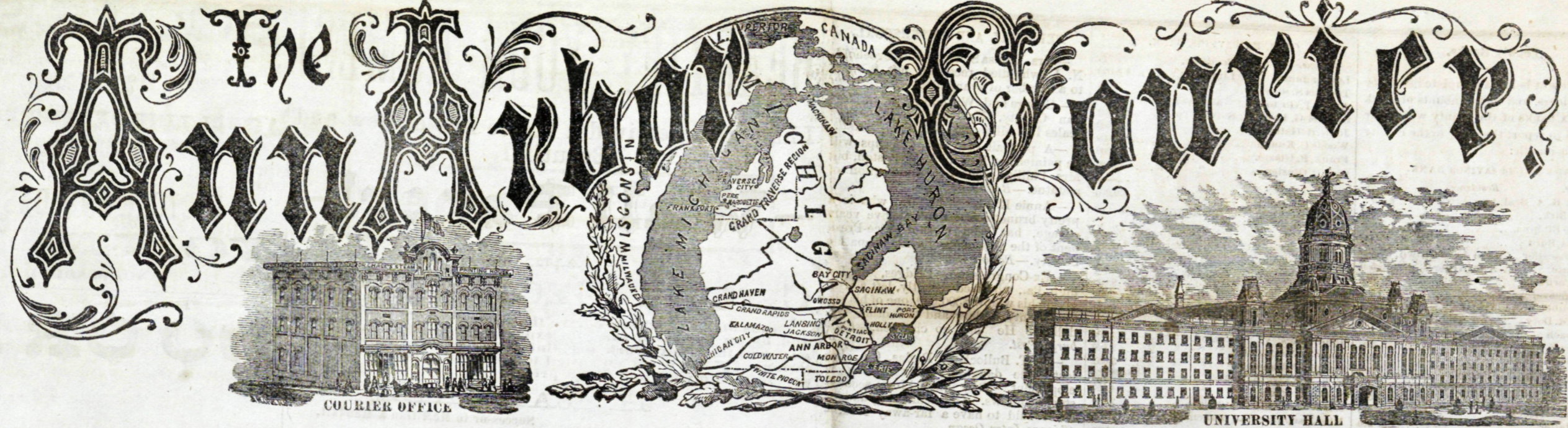

For last Friday evening the enthusiasm of the 1,300 or more attendants upon the Musical Festival showed beyond a doubt that henceforth classical music can have a welcome in our midst.

On the stage, which had been made much larger than usual, was seated the chorus of 150 voices, together with the Amphion Club, the soloists and pianists. As Mr. Cady had trained the Choral Union, and Mr. Pease the Ypsilanti Musical Society, honors were divided between them by the former conducting the chorus by the first of St. Paul and the latter wielding the baton for the second portion. The oratorio consisted of alternate chorals and recitatives. In the latter Mrs. Haviland won applause by her clearness of voice and purity of tone, especially in the aria "Jerusalem, that kiln-blast," etc. The arduous of Miss Joslyn was also very touchingly rendered, and the audience was not satisfied without an encore.

As a consequence of the large attendance some \$300 were cleared, and as a whole, therefore, the Festival was a thorough success. It does great credit to Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti, and encourages something which it is hoped may be made permanent by yearly Festivals which may be to lovers of good music in Michigan what the Cincinnati May Festivals are to the entire West.
