At this meeting Hon. Chas. H. Richmond presided, Geo. H. Pond acted as secretary, and the following committees were appointed: On Finance—To raise funds and have general charge of all expenditures—C. Mack, E. B. Abel, J. H. Brown, G. Frank Alimendiner and Professor M. C. Bond. On Entertainment—Mayor John J. Robison, E. B. Abel, C. H. Pond, H. J. Brown and H. J. Brown and E. B. Abel were appointed a committee to co-operate with the committee of arrangements of the University.

The committee on entertainment was empowered to add one person from each ward to assist them. The committees then went to work with a will and have been working ever since. The prayer of the people here now is for pleasant weather in which to entertain their guests, for the arrangements, though hastily made, are thought to be quite perfect for the purpose.

Friday Morning. 9:00. Guests will assemble at the President's Office and proceed to the Engineering Laboratory. 9:45. (a) Lecture on Anatomy by Dr. Ford in the Medical Building. (b) Lecture on Law in the Law Building. (c) Lecture in the Homeopathic College. The classes in the Academic Department will return to the President's Office where they will be conducted to the large Hall to meet students of departments who will be assembled there.

12:45. Dinner. Afternoon. 1:30. Visits to the Dental College; Chemical Laboratory, Hospitals, Law Library, and the Museum. 4:00. Carriages will be in waiting in front of University Hall to take guests to the train which leaves for Detroit at 4:30.
