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# Summary of the Week.

THE NEWS FROM ALL PARTS.

**DOMESTIC.** By an accident on the 30th of the "Big Four" railroad near Harrison, O., forty passengers were injured, some of them severely.

A CONVENTION of boiler inspectors assembled at Pittsburgh, Pa., on the 29th, and formed a National organization, William McCann, of St. Louis, being chosen president.

The Grand Lodge of Odd-Fellows of Illinois in session on the 29th at Springfield, Ill., elected H. C. Foilman, of Salem, Grand Patriarch.

The National Cattle-Growers' Association held its fourth annual convention at Chicago on the 29th, and recommended the enactment of laws by Congress regulating traffic in cattle and meat.

The report on the 30th of the Commandant of the United States Marine Corps showed that on October 1 there were 1,850 enlisted men in the corps.

Twenty men were convicted on the 30th at Freehold, N. J., of malicious mischief in trying to drive James J. McIntyre, an aged colored man, out of town, and were sentenced to imprisonment.

Two or a gang of counterfeiters operating near Warren, Pa., were arrested on the 29th, and a large amount of spurious money was confiscated.

The house of Jack Gregg, at Bowling Green, Ky., was burned on the 29th, and the only family, consisting of five persons, perished except Gregg, who was away on business.

The twentieth annual meeting of the National Woman's Suffrage Association commenced at Cincinnati on August 27. J. A. and J. T. Tobler (colored) were executed on the 21st at Wichita, Kan., for the killing of James Cass and John Goodenough in the Indian Territory on August 28, 1853.

A SATISFACTORY test was made on the 21st of the telephone line between Boston and Chicago, and it was found to be in good condition.

The Vermont House of Representatives on the 24th refused the Pithkin House Bill a majority vote of 141 to 87.

Mrs. Mary DORAN, of Columbus, O., who murdered her husband last July by pouring carbolic acid in his mouth, was on the 29th acquitted on the ground of insanity.

The total value of merchandise exported from the United States for the year ended October 31, 1888, was \$74,005,330.

The greater part of the business district of Newark, N. J., was destroyed by fire on the 24th, the loss reaching \$100,000.

ALBERT SHULTZ, aged fifty years, of Altoona, Pa., shot and killed his infant son on the 27th. He snatched his gun at him, thinking it was unloaded.

The earth's surface for an area of half a mile square between mines near Wilkes-Barre, Pa., was on the 24th to an average depth of six feet. No lives were lost, but the bursting of water mains flooded the mine.

THE SUPREME COURT of Nebraska decided on the 28th of the case of *In re Estate of R. H. McCann*, and granted a decree of divorce in favor of the petitioner, amounting to \$19,341.40.
