Clifton Springs, N. Y , Sept. 15. Judge Douglas and wife left Canindaigua this morning in a carriage drawn by six horses, and proceeded to the residence of his mother, where he remained until the hour of the meeting at Clifton Springs. The gathering at Clifton Springs has

Naples, Tuesday, Aug. 28. 1860. Contrary rumers are afloat-to the effect that the King will leave immediately for Gueta; another, less probable. that he will head his troops and fight for his crown on the plains of Salerno. On Sunday, his Majesty appeared much in public. In the morning he received the Majors of the twelve battalions of the National Guard, and urged upon them, as Neapolitan citizens, the duty of maintaining order, and of avoiding shedding of blood. He recommended them to guard against all colusion with the military, as neither he nor they could be responsible for the consequences. Weeds. We often see fields, exhausted by ong cultivation, and the own out to rest and replenish themselves, covered with a heavy growth of weeds. So far from renewing their energies, such fields are ecoming exhausted, and will continue to become more so, as long as the veeds are allowed to run riot on them. No crep exhausts the soil more than a 1000 Linen Coat crop of weeds. Actual and accurate experimen's prove, that where the weeds are allowed to grow with the erop, they diminish the crop at least one fourth. They rob the earth of the food required for the growth of useful plants, and when the farmer turns his DRESS AND FROCK COATS and out to rest and replenish its energies, he is but exchanging one kind of erop for a stil worse one, if he allows the weeds to grow and mature their seeds.

So important has this matter become in the view of scientific agriculturists in England that courts are directing the attention of grand jurors to the subject; and through them are forcing the attention of the public to this all im portant matter.

The Irish Royal Agricultural Society have resolved, "That as a great inury arises to the farming classes from the growth of weeds along side of the public roads, whose seeds that being al lowed to ripen and shed, are spread penders, Umbrellas, Carpet Bags, Trunks, &c. No matter how clean our fields are kept, if the corners of the fences are 11lowed to be nurseries from which a e of weeds. Every thistle-top has seeds FRESH ABRIVAL enough to stock acres, and every bur dock can furnish seeds for a town

Let a war of extermination then be waged against these pests of the farmer. Make no trace with a thistle, dock or weed, and besides adding one-fourth to the amount of your crop, you will give your farms a chance to replenish.

WHY DWARF PEARS FAIL .- The Country Gentleman gives five reasons why dwarf pears do not succeed. As they are reasonable ones, we give them for the benefit of our readers: "First, bad stocks to commence with. Second, want of pruning, and allowing them to grow with old, stunted wood Third, want of cultivation, and permitting weeds and grass to grow about their rocts; and not giving them broadcast, mellow culture fourth, want of manure; if the soil is poor and its fertility is not renewed, they cannot flourish. Fifth, a bad selection of sorts Any one of these causes will pro duce failure." We might add to the above, that want of thorough drainage and deep cultivation is often a cause of failure .- Chio Farmer.

The Fest mode for Drying Pumpkins. We love pumpkin pies, even when there is an abundance of tree fruits. Of the various modes of drying, none is equal to the one recommended below: Take the ripe pumpkins, pare, cut in small pieces, stew soft, mash and strain through a colauder, as if for making pies. Spread this pulp on plates in layers, not quite half an inch thick; dry it down in the stove oven kept at a low temperature as not to scorch it. In about a day it will become dry and crisp. The sheets thus made can be stowed away in a dry place, and they are always ready for use for pies or sauce. Soak the pieces over night in a little milk, and they will return to a nice pulp, as delicious as the fresh pumpkins, we think much more so. The quick drying after cooking prevents any portion from souring, as is always the case when the uncooked pieces are dried; the flavor is much better preserved, and the after cooking saved. This plan is quite as little trouble as the old mode, to say nothing of the superiority in the quality of material obtained. Try it, and you will not return to the old mode, we are sure, and you will also become a greater lover of pumpkin pie "the year round," and feel less the loss of the fruit

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
