CARL SCHURZ-Dear Sir :- Having been informed that you intend coming to Boston during this Presidential campaign for the purpose of addressing the pu lie upon national affairs, I would ask of you the favor of meeting me. during your visit, for the purpose of having a public discussion of some of the most important and prominent dog. mas in the creed of the Republican par ty, to all of which I have reason to be lieve that you subscribe.

I would not have intruded on you, sir, especially but for important reasons Sir, you have been heralded throughout the country as an eminent exponent and defender of the Republican creed, and an ardent supporter of M: Abraham Lincoln for the presidency of the United States, a candidate representing only a section of the States composing this confederacy. More than this, you are put forth as the representutive of the sentiments of the great majority of the intelligent adopted citizent

of German birth and extraction. Grapes.

Let us remind our readers that November 25th is about the proper time for trimming out-deor grape vines, and although we admire consistency above al. things, still, whenever we find ourselves in error, we are prompt to acknowledge it, and after an experience of many years in the pruning of grape vines, we are com- | will receive in return by express, free of other charge, pelled to admit, that those who have A ich yornamented Breakfast Cup and Saue pruned less severely have been equally successful; and had they been equally judicious in the manipulation of the soil with ourselves, might have obtained results very superior to others.

Whatever pruning is performed, however, it should be done in November, and in the latter part of the month. At that time there is no fear of bleeding of the vines, and before Spring, the cut ends will have assumed a condition that the rising of the sap in Spring will not cause them to bleed.

Those who will continue to use guano about grape vines, may apply it with less fear of injury in the fall than at any other time for then the roots are dormant, and by the rains of winter, the moltings of snow, etc., the guano may become disseminated throughout the soil so as not to injure the spongioles consequent upon early spring growth.

BY VIETUE OF AN EXECUTION issued out of and under the smal of the Circuit Court for the County of Washtenaw, and State of Michigan, bearing date the 10th day of July 1890, and to me directed and delivered, against the goods and chattels, and for want thereof lands and tonements of Ira Beckley, defendant therein named.
