PROTECTION OF STRAWBERRIES IN VINTER -In protecting the strawberry here may be too much of a good thing. All varieties of this fruit that we have ever experimented with, are benefited by covering. They come out in the Spring earlier, and seem to start stronger. But many who are not acquainted with the habits of the plant, kill them with kindness. They pile on coarse manure, straw, leaves, or fine sen weed, until the plants are smothered. While the plant is in its inactive state, there is little to prevent it from decomposing, by the action of heat and moisture, like other vegetable matter. An examination of a plant taken from under a manure heap, would show that the leaves and crown had rotted.

The strawberry in its uncultivated state grows among the grasses, which, in their decay, form all the protection the plant needs. Nature provides but a light covering to shield it from the brush, are good enough




