Important Treasury Circular—An Appeal for the Popular Loan. WASHINGTON, Sunday, Sept. 1. Secretary Chase has just issued the following patriotic appeal to the citizens of the United States.

Expenses of Recruiting. The following army order gives information respecting the expenses properly incurred in the business of recruiting volunteers.

First—Rendezvous or office for recruiting. Second—Commutation of fuel and quarters for officers already mustered into service, when detached on recruiting duty.

Third—Subsistence of volunteers prior to their muster into service. After such muster, subsistence will be provided by the Subsistence Department.

Fourth—Necessary transportation of volunteers prior to completion of company organization and muster into service as a company.

Fifth—Fuel and straw, previous to company organizing, according to the allowance for the regular army.
