Chiro, Ill., Oct. 8:—
A deserter from Pillow's army, arrived yesterday evening. He reports that A. Johnston is command at Columbus, with forty thousand men.— They have fortified the banks of the river for four miles above Columbus, expecting an attack from the Federalists. Generals Cheatam, Pillow, Polk and Johnston are all at Columbus. The army at that point is well equipped, they have large bodies of cavalry.

On the 22d of September Jeff. Thompson had four thousand men at Belmont. His army is being fast decimated by desertions.

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE PRESERVATION OF ORDER AND QUIET.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen of the City of Ann Arbor:

Resolved, That

any person or persons, or persons, shall be allowed to hold any public auction room or viewing house, or any place of business where wine, beer or spirits are sold, or any place where he or their clerk, agent, servant or employee, shall keep open the same at any time between ten o'clock in the morning, or ten o'clock in the morning, or at any time between ten o'clock Saturday evening and four o'clock the following Monday, or at any time between ten o'clock on any day thereafter during any part of the time above mentioned, for the purpose of trade or otherwise, except as herein otherwise mentioned, during any part of the time above mentioned. That no person other than the holder of a license, or his clerk, agent, servant or employee, except a police officer and his assistant in his company, shall be allowed to sell, or to conduct, or to act as a dealer in, any public auction room or viewing house, or any place of business where wine, beer or spirits liquors are sold, or any place where he or their clerk, agent, servant or employee, shall keep open the same at any time between ten o'clock Saturday night, or before ten o'clock on any day thereafter during any part of the time above mentioned, for the purpose of trade or otherwise, except as herein otherwise mentioned.

SECTION 3d. Every person convicted of a violation of the first section of this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, the costs of prosecution, or be confined in the County Jail not exceeding thirty days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

SECTION 4th. Every person convicted of a violation of the second section of this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of not less than one dollar, nor more than ten dollars, the costs of prosecution, or be confined in the County Jail not exceeding ten days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

SECTION 5th. It shall be the duty of the Sheriff, Sheriff, or any Constable, who shall have knowledge of the violation of this ordinance, to arrest and bring before the persons offending, and commit them for safe keeping to the County Jail, or any other safe place in the County, until one o'clock the next day after their arrest, unless that day shall be Sunday, in which case they shall be committed until one o'clock on Monday and then bring them before a magistrate for examination.
