Let us here stoically distinguish to those who revile us—who threaten with imprisonment for freedom of speech—that during the long period the democratic party held power it made no such arrests. It will soon regain its ascendancy. No effort on your part, however frantic, will prevent this.

GENERAL—As it has not been practically possible to you for the moment to accomplish the great patriotic work which you undertook in the interest of your beloved country, I take the liberty of addressing to you the present letter, with the view of learning whether it would not enter into your plans to offer us your valiant arm in the contest which we sustain for the liberty and unity of our great Republic.

WAR ITEMS. We have taken 500 rebel prisoners, sick and wounded, at Perryville, Darville and Harrodsburg, Ky.

The hospital nurses in New York city have made a request for donations of warm clothing by the charitable to be used for the comfort of the sick and wounded soldiers sent there, who are now suffering for want of articles of the kind.

The rebel killed at Antietam swelled up, and in two hours after death smelt ranker and more offensive, if possible, than while living. This is supposed to be the result of their scanty and unwholesome diet.

Thus the British, while calling upon the Americans to cease their "fratricidal strife" and abusing the Federal Government roundly, are furnishing the rebels with the indispensable means of keeping up that "strife."

From the Army of the Potomac. New York, Oct. 19. The Herald's special from headquarters says one hundred and fifty of Stuart's cavalry have been captured, and it is reported that more will be. Six were found on Friday night in General Kieket's camp, wearing Federal uniforms.
