Gov. Seymour's Letter to the President Washington, Aug. 9. The following is Governor Seymour's

STATE OF NEW YORK, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, ALBANY, AUGUST 3, 1863.

o the President of the United States : Sir-At my request a number of persons have called upon you with respect to the draft in this State, more particularly as it affected the cities of New York and Brooklyn. To avoid misapprehensions, I deem it proper to state my views and wishes in writing. As the draft was one of the causes of the late riot in the city of New York, and as that outbreak has been urged by some as a reason for its immediate execution in that city, it is proper that I should speak of that event. At the moment when the militia of the city were absent, in pursuance of your request, and when the forces of the general government were withdrawn from its fortifications, leaving it defenseless against any attack from abroad or the riot within its limits, the Provost Marshal commenced the draft without consultation with the authorities of the State or of the city. The harsh measure of raising troops by compulsion has heretofore been avoided by this gov ernment, and is now resorted to from the belief on its part that it is necessary for the support of our arms. I know you will agree with me that justice and prudence alike demand that this lottery for life shall be conducted with the utmost fairness and openness, so that all may know that it is impartial and equal in its operations. It is the right of every citizen to be assured that in all public transactions there is strict impartiality in a matter so deeply affecting the persons and happiness of our people. This is called for by every consideration. On the 7th inst., I advised you by letter that I would furnish the strongest proof of the injustice, if not fraud, in the enrollment in certain districts. I now send a full report made to me by Judge Advocate Waterbury, I am confident when you have read it, that you will agree with me, that the honor of the nation and of your administration de-mands that the abuses it points out should be corrected and punished.

You say that we are contending with an enemy who, as you understand, "drives every able-bodied man he can reach into the ranks, very much as a butcher drives bullocks into a slaughter-pen." You will agree with me that even this, if impartially done to all classes, is more tolerable than any scheme which shall fraudulently force a portion of the community into military service by a dishonest perversion of the law.

You will see by the report of Mr. Waterbury, that there is no theory which can explain or justify the enrollment in this State. I wish to call your attention to the tables or pages 5, 6, 7 and 8, which show that in nine Congressional Districts in Manhattan and Staten Islands, the number of conscripts called for is 35,729, while in nineteen other districts the number of conscripts called for is only 39,626. From the Journal of Commerce. The Draft in New York.

All honest, patriotic men desire to sustain the laws of the land. Start with that proposition, and we shall all agree. his no part of a citizen's duty in sus taining a law that he shall support every abitrary act of the subordinates who are employed as enforcers of the law. It encourage officers of the law in wrong doing, by the bold assertion that the law must be put through any how. That would be bad law, bad logic, and bad policy. Let us look at the matter of the draft calmly, in the new light afforded by the astounding report of Judge Advocate Waterbury. This report must overwhelm with wonderment every one who reads it.

The enrollment of the first class in New York city includes more names than the entire male population within the requisite ages, by 16 per cent.
In the Second Ward the whole popu-

lation in 1860 was 2,507; males, 20 to 40-847. The enrollment of the first to partake of its healing qualities. class in this ward is 1,746. The full rote of the ward is only 450.

Nineteen districts which gave a vote of 457,257, with republican majorities, are to furnish 39,626 conscripts, while nine districts which gave democratic majorities, on a vote of only 151,243, are required to furnish 33,729 soldiors!

Twelve districts which gave Seymour majorities, on a vote of 186,355, are to furnish 40,287 conscripts, while sixteen districts, which gave Wadsworth majori ties, on nearly double the vote of the other twelve, to-wit, 353,621, are to furnish fewer conscripts, namely, 33,068. Seven districts in New York and

Brooklyn are to furnish two-fifths of the whole draft, while twenty-one other districts only furnish three-fifths! These facts are unimpeachable. No

one will pretend to deny them. LOCKPORT, Aug. 6, 1863.

The draft, which has just been completed in this [the Twenty-ninth] District, shows that extensive frauds have been perpetrated upon the democracy of Niagara county; and, from reliable reports, the other counties of the district have suffered in the same way.

In the town of Somerset, which, at the last State election, gave Wadsworth, for Governor, 278 votes, and Seymour 98, a majority of the persons drawn are democrats. The town of Niagara, which gave Wadsworth 257 votes, had 122 names drawn from the box, of which 115 were democrats and 7 republicans. The town of Wheatfield, which is inhabited by Germans, and is almost unanimously lemocratic, was placed with a town of the opposite kind in the box, and the remlt showed that the Wheatfield Germans had to furnish the quota for both towns. In the town of Hartland, which gave Wadsworth 117 majority, three-fourths of the names drawn are democrats.

In the lower ward of Lockport where the laboring men reside, and where there are not enough republican voters to perfeet an organization, the names were put with two other wards, and the lower ward furnishes nearly all the men. On one road in this county there resides six democrats and six republicans, the six democrats were drawn, the other six all succeeded in getting off.
