But the bad precedents he has chosen to follow give a certain fitness to the recommendation he has been pleased to make to those who have appealed to him for justice to transfer their application to the Chief Justice of the United States.

The real authors of the mischief in North Carolina are, indeed, not the petty officials immediately answerable for them, but the Federal authorities from whom they derive their inspiration and upon whom they rely for immunity from the consequences of their misdeeds. Nothing is clearer than the fact, which has been demonstrated by the Federal government—having assumed its illegal responsibility—to take care that the men whom it foisted into power shall not abuse that power to the detriment of the people over whom they are set.

And the executive head of that government sits smoking his cigar, and his hands while the man whom he alone retains in power harasses and plunders and molests the men whom the Federal government has abandoned to their will.—N. Y. World.

From the State Gazette. The Rothschilds, King William and Napoleon III. "There will be no war," said lately the aged widow of Mayer Anselm Rothschild to an acquaintance; for my son will not give them the money. This was doubtless, also the idea of her grandson, Alfonso Rothschild, when he came to Ems to induce the King of Prussia to give up his obstinate purpose and to grant some small concession to the long desire of the French monarch.

Perhaps he wished to say to the King that the Rothschilds would furnish him with money; and that if he did not take pity on the embarrassment of the French Emperor they would employ their financial power to the injury of Prussia and Germany.

However, King William cares nothing for all the Rothschilds in the world. He has a well filled treasury, with more than thirty millions of hard dollars, the exact opposite of the French treasury, whose accounts show nothing except on debtor side. Besides, the Council of the North German Confederation, relying on the future approbation of the Diet, has granted him an unlimited credit. The King accordingly was unwilling to revive the financial negotiator; and while he himself packed off the impudent Count Benedetti with a round answer, he sent word to the rich Baron Rothschild by a servant that he was not at home.

At this Mr. Alfonso gets angry and resigns his office as Prussian Consul-General in Paris. It must be admitted that this is a very proper act on his part; for he would by no means be a suitable person to represent the commercial interests of Germany in the French capital at the present time. He ought also to be praised for so promptly resigning the interests of the Emperor, Napoleon. Gratitude is a beautiful but not a very frequent virtue. When the Prince's father, in 1848, was in Paris the personal acquaintance of Louis Napoleon, he was worth about two hundred millions. Out of these two hundred millions, in consequence of the convenient information received from the Cabinet of the President at the time of the coup d'etat, and since then from the Cabinet of the Emperor, he has made two thousand millions; but of these two thousand millions, the greater part is engaged in all sorts of speculation, and enterprises which would turn out disastrously if anything unexpected should happen to the Emperor.
