What is the Germanic Confederation? The Germanic Confederation has a very different meaning now from that which it possessed in 1800. When Napoleon Bonaparte marched across Europe, creating plebeian dynasties and making a new geography, the Ancient Empire of Germany was broken up.—Before that time the hereditary rulers of Austria were ex officio, so to speak, Emperors of Germany. Before the irresistible armies of Bonaparte the German Empire was dissolved. The Emperor of Germany became simply the Emperor of Austria again. Bonaparte erected what he called the Confederation of the Rhine, and the German States, each looking out for itself, waited, in a state of abeyance, for results.

At last Bonaparte's "fortune" desert-Lubeck, and Bremen-in all, thirty-two independent states and sovereignties, besides Hesse - Hamburg, which had been incorporated with the grand duchy of Hesse-Darmstadt. Austria was the President of this league, having in a general way the direction of the Diet.

Under this Confederacy each State was independent, and the union existed chiefly for the common defense. It was governed by a House of Representatives which bound the American colonies together for freedom and war, except that the plenum, instead of consisting of men chosen from the people, was composed of diplomatic delegates appointed by the different sovereigns, and forming

It virtually suggested the formation of a solid empire of Germany; the election of repre-sentatives by the popular vote; the regulation of tariffs, customs, consulships, oinage, commerce, and the army and by the general Diet, instead of by the separate sovereignties. Austria violently resisted this movement, and

under her lead it was voted down. Then William boldly declared the Confederation dissolved and placed Prussia in an attitude of open rebel ion against the Diet. His withdrawal was followed by prince after prince, and the war began. The Prussian army crossed the borders of Hesse on June 15, and on August 30 dictated terms to Austria in the treaty of Prague. The old Confederacy was broken up, Austria was driven out permanently. Two new confederations were formed-the North and South German, to the former of which Prussia belongs and of both of which William is virtually Emperor .-The North German Confederation is mainly Protestant-the South German,
