The proceedings of the Third district
Convention, published last week, were
incomplete, and being incomplete did
unquestionably injure to P. M. EATON, Esq.,
of Ypsilanti, who was a candidate for the
nomination and received a large proportional
vote on three ballots. The memorandum
of proceedings furnished us omitted any
reference to more than one ballot.

THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

Our space not permitting a full report of
the proceedings of the Supervisors, we run
them through a condenser, giving the most
important:

MONDAY, Oct. 10th, 1870.
Roll was called, Board organized, and
standing committees appointed, as heretofore
reported.
A communication was received from
Judge HENY, certifying that the appointment
of a Circuit Court Stenographer was
desirable, which was referred to a committee,
consisting of Messrs. Arms, Wall, and
Leonard.

TUESDAY, Oct. 11th, 1870.
J. M. Cole was appointed Reporter, at
\$35; the usual resolution was adopted,
prohibiting allowing claims of Justices without
an affidavit that all fine moneys have
been paid over; October 22d, was fixed as
the limit for receiving claims; Messrs.
Webb, Crippen and Tuomy were appointed
a committee to visit and report upon the
condition of the Poor House; the opinion
of the Attorney General was requested as
to the character of the certificate necessary
to be attached to the tax rolls; a resolution,
based on petition, was adopted, requiring
the Superintendents of Poor to itemize
their accounts; and several communications
from the Auditor General were received
and referred.

WEDNESDAY, October 12th, 1870.
A resolution was offered, tabled, and
made special order rescheduling resolution
of yesterday, directing report of Superintendents
of Poor itemized.

THURSDAY, Oct. 13th, 1870.
Resolution rescinding that directing
itemized report of Superintendents of Poor
was adopted, year 18, says 10; a resolution
advising for proposals to furnish all principal
or standard goods was offered and
tabled; a lightning rod communication
was received and referred to committee on
public buildings; a resolution fixing the
aggregated equalized valuation of the
County at \$12,500,000, referred to committee
on equalization.

FRIDAY, Oct. 14th, 1870.
A communication from S. Pettibone &
Co., proposing to make a county map on
a scale of 12 inches to a town, and asking an
appropriation of \$100 was received and
tabled; Mr. Crane appeared for the Agricultural
Society, stated its condition and
asked an appropriation of \$300; the salaries
of county officers were established at:
County Treasurer, \$1,200.
Clerk, 1,000.
Prosecuting Attorney, 1,000.
Superintendent of Schools, \$4.50
per day for 300 days, 1,350.
\$20 voted to each paper in the county
publishing proceedings in full; five
accounts reported by committee on civil
claims, and allowed; and Board adjourned
to Monday.

Representative Convention—4th District.
The Democratic nominating
convention for the Fourth Representative
District was held, pursuant to call, at
Chelsea, on Saturday, October 22d,
1870.

Hon. C. S. GREGORY, of Esio, was
elected President, and ASA BLACKNEY,
of Sylvan, Secretary.

Each town in the district was fully
represented.
Several ballots for a candidate were
had as follows:

For W. A. Jones, 1st. 23. 3d.
" J. M. Congdon, 11 13 15
" Abram Self, 1 1 1

JAMES M. CONGDON, of Sylvan, was
unanimously declared nominated.

On motion, Messrs. Elias Haire, Orrin
Thatcher, and H. H. Jones were appointed
the District Committee for the ensuing term.

After which the convention adjourned
sine die.

FINE LONG WOOLED SHEEP.—In our
notice of the late County Fair we briefly
stated that E. L. BOYDEN, of Webster, had
on exhibition a fine lot of Long Wooleed
Sheep—Cotswolds and Leicester—recently
imported from Canada, and on which he
took four first premiums. In connection
with a neighbor Mr. BORDEN brought in
90 head in all, 69 bucks and 30 ewes. A
portion of his flock he purchased of Mr. F.
W. STONE, of Guelph, one of the best known
and most extensive breeders in Canada,
and the rest of other well-known breeders
in that vicinity, great care being used
in selecting. His flock will be a great addition
to the fine sheep of which the county could
before boast, and we commend him to those
wishing to improve their flocks, and breed
either for mutton or wool. The long wool
is now at the top of the market, and for
mutton nothing can begin with the Cotswolds
and Leicesters.

Mr. Boyden will be pleased to show
his flock to any farmers or friends at any
time, and hopes to be able to meet the
wishes of breeders both as to quality and
price.

DETOUR, October 26.
Dealers show more disposition to meet
advance in the east on wheat, and the market
is 3/8c better than last week. Flour is unchanged,
though some stronger. Receipts of wheat and
flour are liberal, and transactions moderate.
There is a little movement in barley, but at
a wide range of prices, and it is difficult
to get quotations. Other grains on
changed. Apples are in some shipping
demand for winter varieties. Beans are
also coming in demand for shipment,
the mining and lumber regions being
customers. Butter is scarcely as firm as
last week, but declined about 1c. Eggs are
in good demand, with an advance of
3/4c. Dressed Hogs are in somewhat
liberal supply from farms, but at lower
prices, 80c being now about extreme rates
for light to heavy. Hogs in Chicago show
a steady downward tendency.
