

Peace between Germany and France. The Atlantic cable brings the well authenticated news that a treaty of peace has been concluded between the two great nations whose bloody struggle has occupied the attention of the civilized world for more than a month.

The reported conditions are rigorous and hard; but they are as favorable as France had any reason to expect from a conqueror whose success has been so signal and so overwhelming. A nation which has been the victor in a war, and which, at its close, lies prostrate and helpless at the feet of a victorious enemy, has no choice but to submit to such terms as the conqueror imposes.

The loss of territory is a mere humiliation to France; but as Germany is not allowed to retain what she has conquered by her arms, France has no choice, and has consented to Metz and Alsace and Lorraine, including Metz and Nancy. It is not so much the mere territory that Germany wanted as the fortress. The possession of the great stronghold of Metz gives Germany complete security against future attacks from France, and will render it easy for her to pour an inundation of troops into France, whenever their peaceful relation shall be again disturbed.

If a French army should ever be starting north to attack Metz in advance towards the Rhine, its line of communication and supplies could be immediately cut, and it would be exposed to attack both in front and rear. But France, on the other hand, by the loss of this great stronghold is exposed to invasion unresisted except by troops in the open field. This is a serious blow to the defense and security of France, as well as to her national pride; but she took the chances of war and must not grumble at having to pay the stakes. Other nations look on with pity and regret, but they have no right to protest.

Besting this painful cession of territory and important fortresses, the treaty includes a money indemnity which will prove burdensome to the exhausted nation on which it is imposed. That the amount is much smaller than the demand reported at the beginning of the armistice does not prove that German rapacity is less grasping, but only that it is more cautious and circumspect. If the demand had been as exorbitant as was at first stated, France could not have borrowed a dollar in any money market of the world, as capitalists would have had an utter distrust in her ability to pay.

Germany would have got nothing at present, and have run the hazard of a total repudiation of the debt. She has therefore graduated her demand to the ability of her prostrate victim for immediate payment. Germany has not exacted a greater sum than France will be able to borrow if she succeeds in setting up a government which has a fair prospect of stability. France is to pay \$20,000,000 of Prussian thalers, equivalent to about \$240,000,000 of our money. There is no reason to doubt the ability of France to raise this sum by domestic and foreign loans, although, in her present condition, she will have to pay a high rate of interest, probably not less than seven per cent., which would make the annual interest \$18,000,000, or a little more than one-fifth of the interest paid by France on her public debt in the year 1869. The whole revenue of France in 1869 was about \$75,000,000. The indemnity of \$240,000,000 is therefore a trifle more than three-fifths of her annual revenue before the war. She can stand this burden, though for a while she may stagger under it.

Let us hope that she will establish a wise, liberal, and moderate government, and devote herself for the next generation to the art of peace. By reducing her military establishment she may easily save the indemnity; and if she should have her army should induce other countries to curtail their military expenses, the general reduction would be a blessing to all Europe.—N. Y. World.

HOEOPATHIC LEGISLATION.
In the House, on Monday, Mr. Cannon, from the Committee on State Affairs, reported "a bill to provide for the appointment of two Professors of Homeopathy in the Department of Medicine in the University," and recommended its passage. We are not advised as to whether the bill makes a specific appropriation for the payment of such Professors, or leaves the Regents to pay them from the University fund.

In reporting the bill the committee wisely intimate that "the Regents are to select the persons to be appointed, and the servants and not the masters of the people," which solemn truth—it must be solemn to be asserted—would not warrant them in obeying legislative interference with their constitutional duties, and any act assuming to regulate the internal arrangements and discipline of the institution, or requiring the appointment of a special professor in any department, is just such an interference. The Legislature may make any appropriation in aid of the University conditional upon compliance with either the wise or foolish terms it may prescribe, but the regular funds of the University are happily beyond its control.

We are not about to dispute the claims of Homeopathy; we concede the intelligence of its friends and supporters, professional and laymen; we recognize their rights as tax-payers, "and all o' that," but to believe that two medical systems diametrically opposed to each other can be taught to the same classes, to the benefit of either, is to "go back on human nature." However, as our views may be charged to the account of ignorance, prejudice or obstinacy, we let the Lansing correspondent of the Detroit Tribune, a gentleman of decided homeopathic proclivities, speak his views of the bill and its provisions:

"It contains the most unsatisfactory solution of the problem possible. In the first place, there is no probability that the Regents will obey it any more than they did the similar law of 1865. Therefore it offers no practical relief to the homopaths, and it leaves this vexed question to torment future Legislatures, and to disturb the University. In the second place, if carried out, it will break up the medical department of the University unquestionably. People may say that it need not, but the fact is that it would. Thus it is a proposition that has no chance for success, and is not to be recommended. In its favor are much less potent than those in favor of the establishment of a separate and distinct homeopathic department, either elsewhere than at Ann Arbor, or at that place during those months of the University year that the regular school is not in session."

—The present medical department of the University, established before Homeopathy had attained to the least prominence or standing as a system, is doing a good work for the State and its citizens, and should not be disrupted in the manner recommended. It is useless to say that the professors therein should not object to the proposed action, that they should be able to maintain their ground against what they claim is error, etc. Medical professors are none the less human beings, and when oil and water mix then two opposite systems may be expected to work harmoniously together, and students be benefited by being taught one thing one hour and its reverse the next. The only way, in our opinion, out of the woods is a separate and distinct department, either at the University or in some other locality, and we know that such is also the opinion of many earnest believers in Homeopathy.

Congress has reached another stage in the "contesting game." A day or two ago the House passed a resolution to pay the widow of a contestant who had deceased, with his "head in chancery," the sum of \$2,500, expenses of contesting. We congratulate the widow on the liberality of the House—with the moneys of their constituents; but ask again, is it not time for Congress to turn over a new leaf and dispose of contested seats at the opening of the term? Every case ought to be disposed of within the first few weeks of the first session of each Congress.

—Dr. MILLER, of Georgia, who has been knocking at the door of the Senate for two or three years, was admitted to his seat on Saturday last. As this session and his term both expire to-day, he will have the honor of being Senator seven days, and the pleasure of pocketing \$5,000 for a single week of service inside the Senate Chamber. And the country need not be surprised if, "by resolution," he shall be paid for the years he has been "knocking at the doors." If he were a Radical we'd bet on this issue of his adventure.

—Since the above paragraph was written the proceedings of Monday have come to hand, from which we quote: "A resolution was passed providing for the compensation of the Georgia Senators, Messrs. HILL and MILLER, from the date of their election, July 29th, 1868, and the contestants, FARROW and WHITELEY, from their alleged election to the date at which they were declared not entitled to seats." There, we were either in a prophetic spirit, or it is safe to reason on the liberality of a Congressional Senate or House in those latter days. We have serious thoughts of contesting the seat of FERRY in the next Congress. It matters not that nobody ever voted or thought of voting for us as against FERRY or any other man," don't Farrow and Whiteley get paid for claiming seats not vacant when their friends went "through the motions of electing them," and why not we draw pay for claiming a seat to which we were not elected? The difference is less than that "twixt twiddle-dum and twiddle-dee." Well, "the people pay the fiddler."

While the coal operators and coal miners of Pennsylvania are playing into each other's hands, and while strikes are "put up" by mine owners and coal put up in New York to freezing prices, the protectionists have a hard grip upon the throat of Congress, the introduction of a bill to take off the duty is not permitted, and the monopolists are enjoined from the legislative halls of the capitol to demand the pound of flesh as "nominated in the bond." Admit coal free of duty and the Nova Scotia mines will be worked by New York and Boston capital; keep on the duty and the Pennsylvania mine owners are given a club with which to beat down any competition. By working the year through so much coal would be mined that high prices could not be demanded; to stop mining voluntarily would be too patent a way to an increase of price, and would not be tolerated; and so strikes are manufactured and manipulated in a business way, the striking miners being only the tools of the mine owners, the cats' paws pulling the chestnuts from the fire. How many congressmen, who vote persistently against taking off the imprudently coal duty, are interested in the Pennsylvania mines, or who give their votes to secure Pennsylvania votes for other schemes? on the principle of "you tickle me Billy, and I'll tickle you Tommy." It is about time that the masses made themselves heard at Washington, and that such wholesale robbery of the people for the benefit of a small number of mining capitalists was stopped.

—Willing to recognize anything good that Congress may do, we cheerfully add that on Tuesday a successful move was made to give the coal monopolists a rap. In the House, Mr. Wood, of New York, got the floor by a sheer oversight of the protectionists, and moved that the rules be suspended and a bill passed repealing all laws and parts of laws imposing a duty on foreign coal, the bill to take effect at once." The motion was so presumptuous and impudent that KEXLEY, MORRELL & Co. were stunned, and before they recovered the rules were suspended and the bill passed by yeas, 144, nays, 48.

The Senate on Tuesday, by a vote of 26 to 2, passed "a bill to provide for the erection of a new State Capitol, and a building for the temporary use of the State offices." We have not the bill before us, but understand that it provides for the erection of a building for temporary State offices in the corner of the present capitol square, so that the rickety building now used for that purpose may be torn down, and the new capitol building erected on its site. The bill makes an appropriation of \$100,000, provides for building commissioners, plans, etc. It is time that a new capitol was commenced, and we hope that the House will concur in the bill.

—The Senate, also, on the same day, passed a bill appropriating \$100,000 for a laboratory building at the Agricultural College. The House struck a sectional making a similar appropriation for its bill making the usual annual appropriations for the support of the college.

A BRIEF editorial article in the ARGUS of the 10th of February, commenced with the following sentences: "Since the San Domingo Commission called the attention of the people to the ground that if a report shall be made that the Dominicans favor annexation the Senate will feel bound to ratify the treaty of peace, the opinion of our people to be formed, or is one party to a bargain sufficient in this case?"

The able correspondent of the N. Y. World, now "doing San Domingo" in the company of the Government Commission, harbors the same idea, and writing from the city of San Domingo, under date of February 14th, he says, speaking of "an intelligent and clear-headed German physician who has passed many years in both parts of the island, and whom he had 'interviewed.'"

"It is his belief that both sections of the island absolutely need the extension over them of some well organized foreign administration, and that the political, social and social decomposition, and he maintains that all the best part of the population of both sections of the island are of this mind. All of which, however, while it tends to show that Santo Domingo and Hayti have much reason to desire annexation to the United States, does not exactly prove that the United States ought to desire annexation to Santo Domingo and Hayti."

That's exactly the point before the country, and one which can not be determined by the wishes of BAZZ or the votes of his constituents. The condition of the island and the wants of its people may throw a little light upon the main question, which is: Will the best interests of this Republic be promoted by establishing a colonial system, or by absorbing the outlying islands and distant States with their diverse interests and mongrel populations? And on that we vote no.

In the Senate, on Tuesday, by a vote of 18 to 10, a bill was passed, entitled "a bill to protect the people of the State of Michigan against empiricism and imposition in the practice of medicine and surgery." If it shall go through the House, spiritual physicians, healing mediums, etc., will have to organize county societies and vote themselves diplomats.

—The Tribune says that Senator ORAYATH advocated its passage, but the journal of the day records him as voting against it, and as moving the following title: "a bill to protect empiricism and imposition in the practice of medicine and surgery in the State of Michigan."

The enormous increase in the price of coal within the past day or two serves to point the explanation we have previously given of the causes and the foreshadowing we have made of the results of the society which undoubtedly exists. The "prayer" which has been circulated in Philadelphia, however severely and justly in the form of it may be condemned, is worth reproducing to show those who are responsible for this state of things how intense the indignation of those who suffer by it is, and how precarious their own profits are so long as they are placed by shameless extortion at the mercy of the miners who deserve to be heard also. The companies have had the cunning heretofore to shift the odium of the sudden and enormous rise of prices from their own shoulders to those of a class which can give no better expression than the inarticulate form of a strike to the story of its own wants and woes. It has been shown that the difference in the wages of miners between their receipts and their demands is an infinitesimal fraction of the difference between what the price of coal ought to be and what it is.

The last turn of the screw is so sudden and so severe that the responsibility of it cannot be evaded by those who have brought it about. A difference of from \$5 to \$7 a ton in the price of coal means to many thousands of families in New York and Philadelphia the difference between decent comfort and abject destitution. Even the Legislature of Pennsylvania can hardly be so deaf to the cry of a plundered public as to refuse taking some real and not merely plausible measures to prevent the recurrence of this flagrant and pernicious swindle. It will be well for the monopolists if the legislature permits to prey upon the public to be administered that there is a point at which public resistance to outrageous extortion can organize itself, and that such an organization is apt to do justice in a wild and hasty way. ... six grape vines. A few days ago, while talking on the subject of grapes with a friend, who has been growing a small plot of ground and built a house upon it, intending to make it a pleasant home, he solicited my advice on two points about growing grapes. In the yard in the rear of his house, there is only room to plant six vines; and he wanted to know in the first place, what good variety to select, and when selected, how to plant them so that the vines would grow and bear well. To reply to the first question, I told him to plant four well grown, one year old Concord, one Delaware, and one Iona, to make up his list.

The Concord, although not up to the standard of excellence in quality to either the Delaware or Iona as a table grape, still its vigorous habit of growth and productiveness make it a favorite sort wherever it is known. It grows rapidly and bears abundantly, so that when the Concord is planted in a city yard, it is always certain of having plenty of fruit, even if it is not of the best quality. This variety bears the same relation to the list of grapes that the Iona does to the Delaware. The Bartlett in pears, and Wilson's Albany among strawberries. The Concord is not and can not be rated as number one in quality, but it is not by any means an inferior table grape. When well grown, it is a large berry and bunch, and the fruit is becoming more popular as it is becoming better known to consumers in the New York market the present season, the Concord sold as readily as any other variety and at rates per pound, taking the season through, only a trifle lower than the old and favorite variety, the Iona.

The quality of the Delaware has never been questioned. When the fruit is ripe, it is always of good quality. But the drawback to its culture is its naturally slow habit of growth. The ripened wood of the Delaware is sharp-pointed, and exceedingly hard for grape-wood. Growers sometimes lose patience with it on this account, and have it rooted up and replaced by some other kind. But in low countries, favorable for a vigorous growth of the Delaware, it generally gives satisfaction in quality and in quantity of fruit. The Iona has always had, and still retains, excellent quality, and is a variety which is fully ripened. This variety was seriously injured by its best friends, when it was first introduced. There were thousands of vines propagated from green wood, and sent all over the country. The vines propagated in this way, when planted in the open field, gave poor satisfaction to the purchasers, and very soon unfavorable reports were circulated, condemning the Iona as not being hardy, subject to rot, mildew, etc.

It has taken several years to overcome popular prejudice against the Iona, mainly on account of the poor results purchasers had who planted some of the vines which were principally propagated from green wood. There is no doubt that this variety does inherit some of the bad qualities of its parent; but notwithstanding that, will be large plantations made of the Iona, for wine making purposes, in some grape growing sections in the latitude of New York, where an amateur has room for only ten or twelve grape vines, it is well enough to include the Iona in the list when planting a vine or two, but not rely upon it for the principal supply of fruit. In case he does it more than likely that he will be sorely disappointed. — New York Tribune.

Two Bonaparte Princesses. Without overstepping the bounds of social propriety, brief allusion in commendation may be permitted, after half a century to persons already historical as near relatives of Napoleon. He himself, on one occasion, speaking of his mother, said that she was a woman of noble nature, who had trained her children well, suffering nothing but what was great and elevated to take root in their understandings, abhorring falsehood, and not tolerating the slightest trace of dissimulation, the strictest of a man with the tenderness and delicacy of a woman. Her lovely face accounted for many noble traits in her descendants; and it has been well remarked by Sir Bernard Burke that "the ladies of the Bonaparte family were, to a surpassing degree, remarkable for talent, beauty and strength of mind." Such encomium had special application to the daughters of Lucien, whose society constituted one chief source of our enjoyment in Rome.

In their salacious conversation flowed on with a pleasant ripple of feeling and good humor, being so a fitting cloud of passion passed among the two, and antiquity to the Eternal City were excellent linguists, at home in French and English as in Italian. The Princess Gabrielle, an excellent musician, sang with great sweetness and effect; and Treutauva, who had also a good voice, contributed his part to the general entertainment. An improviser, a variety of social amusement then in vogue, often attended. Thorswalden and many other celebrities frequented the palace, as well as cardinals and other dignitaries of the Church. Cardinal Fesch, the uncle of Lucien, was well dignified, frank and cordial in his address. In person he was not unlike our late Secretary of State, not very tall or stout, bearing himself simply and without pretension, engaging readily in conversation, with a voice and expression peculiarly winning. His usual dress was of white cloth or flannel, with the red stockings indicative of his rank in the hierarchy. He was good enough to procure for us an interview with the Pope, then Leo XII, with whom we passed half an hour in animated conversation.

Early through the friendship of the Cardinal and his lovely niece, who were so kind as to take an especial interest that we should pass our time pleasantly in Rome, partly from our other letters of introduction, opportunities were constantly offered us to attend balls at the great palaces, never seen to such advantage as on these occasions. The Countess Pessi, still very young, excelled in the waltz, a dance then recently introduced in polite society, and already in a degree superseding the quadrille. Both sisters were apparently unacquainted with any special claim to consideration, putting every one at ease in their presence. They were gay and companionable, quick at repartee, and always graceful and engaging. We were indebted to them for many pleasant acquaintances, and found they were equally disposed to devote their own moments to our entertainment. — From the ATLANTIC MONTHLY for March.
