The Detroit Tribune of Monday published in full Dr. HAYDEN'S discourse or lecture of Sunday evening last, before the Christian Association of the University. The subject was "The relation of Darwinism to Christianity."

The Circuit is still in session, but "makes haste slowly." We note the disposition of the following cases since our last week's report: Clements vs. Brown and Brown. Judgment for plaintiff, on default, \$233.49.

Geo. A. Peters vs. Cornelius C. Crawford. Trial concluded. Verdict not guilty. Henry Fisher vs. Commissioner of the State. Judgment for plaintiff on default, \$333.66.

Fredk. Fisher, by his next friend, Esq. Aaron Feidkamp. Verdict for defendant, six cents damages. Time granted to move a new trial.

Jacob April vs. J. G. Albrecht. Judgment for plaintiff, on default, \$1,039.16. Ralph W. Van Fossen vs. Thomas T. Hodson. New trial granted.

Mary Peavey vs. Martin L. Peavey. Divorce decreed. In the matter of the appeal of E. D. Bliss from the decision of the Commission on the estate of Charles Stock. Judgment for claimant for amount allowed, and against claimant for costs to be taxed.

The Detroit, Hillsdale and Indiana R. R. Co. vs. Sponcer Rogers. Judgment for plaintiff, on default, \$197.76. The same plaintiff vs. James Whaley. Judgment for plaintiff, on default, \$337.80.

The People vs. Philip Johns. Information for burning insured property (two threshing machines, in September, 1869) with intent to defraud the insurer, The German Farmers' Fire Insurance Company. Jury impaneled Monday afternoon. Trial not yet (Thursday P. M.) concluded.

This case is prosecuted by Prosecuting Attorney Uhl, assisted by Messrs. Hawkins, Beakes, and Frazier; and Johns is defended by Messrs. D. Francis and C. Joslin. Sundry persons, passengers landing at New York, importers and others, testified before the Custom house investigating committee to having quietly and with never a word slipped greenbacks, etc., into the hands—perhaps we should write "itching palms"—of officials of various grades, in consideration of which a very slight examination (of baggage) for some other favor was of course expected. Now, we have reason to suspect that somebody with a hatchet to grind has been playing the same little game on us.
