The Yellowstone Park.
The hungry patrons of cheap restaurants down town must occasionally have been called by the notice posted conspicuously over the counter, "all pastry consumed in this establishment is made on the premises." Without committing ourselves to the general principle of protection to home manufactures, we may afford to rejoice at the measure tending to encourage the practice of doing our own pleasing within our own borders. The recent Act of Congress concerning a singularly picturesque piece of land, known as the Yellowstone region, will call attention to the unexplored richness of Montana and Wyoming Territories as a field for the artist or the pleasure tourist, while it aims to insure that the region in question shall be kept in the most favorable condition to attract travel and gratify a cultivated and intelligent curiosity. By the Act some 2,500 square miles of territory at the headwaters of the Yellowstone, and the park is set apart as a National Park (U) with a Superintendent (the Secretary of the Interior) authorized to take all measures to keep the region in such a condition as most fully to answer the purpose of a great national park. The park is a colossal sort of junketing-plate! The Yankee in the story-book claimed that America could boast of bigger lakes, larger rivers, grander thunder, and fiercer lightning than any other country. If any one doubts this, hereafter we shall refer him to the Yellowstone Park. Everything in it seems on a scale out of all proportion to ordinary experience, and conventional habits of thought. While European people are wont to be astonished at the little rills or lakes, or painfully heap up little nuggets of rock-work in their pleasure grounds, Nature has given us one here, ready made, which dwarfs all that they can do. The park is a vast, open, and beautiful landscape, with its mountains, lakes, and rivers, all of which are of a grand and majestic character.

The Atlantic Monthly Attacks Grant.

The replies of the friends of the administration to the charges made against the President have been the first consideration merely as replies, singularly ineffective. 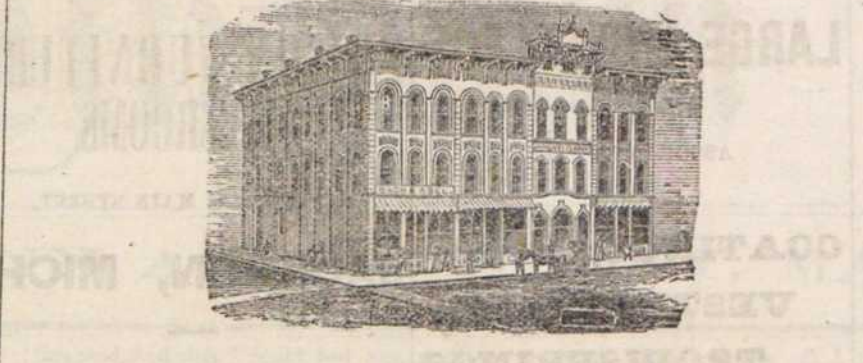

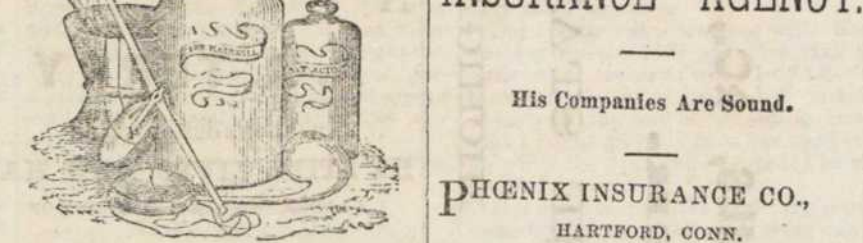
