The two rival Legislatures of Alabama are besieging the Government at Washington for recognition. What has the President, the Secretary of State, or any other department of the Government at Washington to do with the exclusively local affairs of Alabama? Just as much as with those of Michigan; exactly nothing at all.

Ward Hunt, the newly appointed Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, vice Justice Nelson, resigned, is 62 years old; lives at Utica, N. Y.; has been a Judge of the Court of Appeals; and is now one of the Commissioners of Appeals.

The editor of the N. Y. Tribune, or report is at fault again; another rumor says that the Harpers are negotiating for the purchase of the concern, Geo. W. Curtis to be the editor. Are both reports true?

Judge Settle, failing to get upon the Supreme Court of the United States as a reward for his services in the Confederate army and at Philadelphia, has been commissioned by Gov. Caldwell as a Judge of the Supreme Court of North Carolina.

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Mayor's Proclamation.

At a meeting of the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor, held on the 23d day of November, 1872, the following resolutions were adopted: Resolved, That the Mayor be, and is hereby requested, to call a meeting of the electors of the city of Ann Arbor at an early day as is practicable, for the purpose of electing a Board of Water Commissioners to be appointed for the year 1873, and to consider the proposition of the issue of the bonds of the city, payable in twenty years, for the purpose of erecting and building Water Works and the purchase of all necessary real estate and water power, for the purpose of supplying the city and the inhabitants thereof, with pure and wholesome water, under the following conditions, regulations, and restrictions, to-wit:

First, The Common Council shall have authority and it shall be their duty to issue to a Board of Water Commissioners appointed by the Council, the bonds of the city, payable in twenty years, for the purpose of erecting and building Water Works and the purchase of all necessary real estate and water power, for the purpose of supplying the city and the inhabitants thereof, with pure and wholesome water, under the following conditions, regulations, and restrictions, to-wit:

Second, For the expenditure of the proceeds of said bonds in the erection of Water Works and their subsequent control and operation, the Common Council shall appoint five Water Commissioners, who shall hold office for one year, and whose term of office shall be subject to the election of the electors of the city at the next annual election. The Commissioners shall receive no salary, but shall be reimbursed for their expenses.

Third, The Water Commissioners appointed by the Council shall have sole and exclusive control of the construction and control of all Water Works, except as herein expressed. They shall be empowered to acquire all necessary real estate and water power, and to make all contracts and arrangements necessary for the erection and building of Water Works, and for the purchase of all necessary real estate and water power, for the purpose of supplying the city and the inhabitants thereof, with pure and wholesome water, under the following conditions, regulations, and restrictions, to-wit:

Fourth, The Water Commissioners, after paying the interest on the bonds of the city, shall have the proceeds of the bonds of the city, to be used for the purpose of erecting and building Water Works, and for the purchase of all necessary real estate and water power, for the purpose of supplying the city and the inhabitants thereof, with pure and wholesome water, under the following conditions, regulations, and restrictions, to-wit:

Fifth, All those who are in favor of the issue of the bonds of the city, for the purpose of erecting and building Water Works, and for the purchase of all necessary real estate and water power, for the purpose of supplying the city and the inhabitants thereof, with pure and wholesome water, under the following conditions, regulations, and restrictions, to-wit: They shall vote "Yes." All opposed, "No."

Now, therefore, in obedience to the instructions contained in the foregoing resolution, I hereby direct and appoint a meeting of the electors of the city of Ann Arbor, on Monday, the 23d day of December, 1872, at 10 o'clock A. M., to elect a Board of Water Commissioners, and to consider the proposition of the issue of the bonds of the city, payable in twenty years, for the purpose of erecting and building Water Works and the purchase of all necessary real estate and water power, for the purpose of supplying the city and the inhabitants thereof, with pure and wholesome water, under the following conditions, regulations, and restrictions, to-wit:
