It is to be regretted, however, that in a few instances directors have been elected from the fact that they were known to be opposed to progress and the County Superintendent, and in favor of low taxes and low wages for teachers, and the people who have elected them have been the losers in having poor schools which is generally the result of a narrow policy.

During the past year I have examined and granted certificates to 339 teachers, graded as follows: First grade, 11; second grade, 108; third grade 220. An increasing and incessant effort has been made to advance the standard of scholarship among the teachers.

During the summer term, in the rural districts, 68 teachers, or 46 per cent. of the whole number, engaged in the opening exercises; eighty-four, or 57 per cent. of the whole read the Bible; thirty-one, or 22 per cent. of the whole number, opened school with prayer.

During the winter term, 49 practiced singing; 72 read the Bible; and 35 opened school with prayer. Whole number of visits made by School Directors during the year, 337; number of schools visited, 118; whole number not visited by Directors during the year, 52.

County Superintendent's Report.

To the Hon. Daniel B. Briggs, Superintendent of Public Instruction: SIR—I have the honor herewith to submit my annual report, as County Superintendent of Schools for Washtenaw County.

The general progress of the schools in the county during the year has been encouraging, and, as a class, our schools are in a prosperous condition. More liberal and enlightened views upon the subject of popular education have been developed; better systems of culture have been put into practical operation, which have more fully met and supplied the increasing wants of a higher civilization.

Improvements can be seen not only in the proficiency of teachers and their management of schools, but also in the interest and co-operation of school officers and parents in securing well qualified teachers, and in the intelligent appreciation with which thorough instruction is regarded.

The total number of children in the county between the age of five and twenty years is 12,891. Of this number, 9,951, or 77 per cent. of the whole number, attended the public schools some portion of the year.

The total number of months taught in the county during the year was 1,917; taught by males, 446-1/2; by females 1,470-1/2. The number of months taught in rural districts by males, 321; by females, 851-1/2. Whole number of months taught in union and graded schools by males, 129; by females, 619.

The total amount of wages paid teachers in the county during the year, \$65,680; amount paid male teachers, \$24,988; paid female teachers, \$40,692. Total amount of salaries paid to superintendents in this county, \$12,354; paid females, \$17,640. Total paid males in union schools, \$12,644; paid females, \$22,982.
