DYWIDOFF KLINCKE, reported as lost on the Schiller, was Secretary of the Chicago, Saginaw and Canada railroad, and was going to Europe to negotiate a loan for the company.

In view of a large number of idle and suspicious characters hanging about the city, Mayor Hayden, of Jackson, has directed the police to be vigilant and arrest all such persons.

This company of Detroit people intending to settle a Michigan colony in California have decided to locate in San Joaquin valley, where they have contracted to purchase 4,300 acres of land for \$73,000.

At Berlin, Ottawa county, on the morning of Wednesday, the 12th inst., Mr. Wilde, a prominent officer of the Patrons of Husbandry in Michigan, committed suicide by hanging himself in his son's barn, with a halter taken from one of the horses.

The circus showed at Battle Creek last week. While the procession was passing through Main street, and the clerks were out on the sidewalk to see the elephant, thieves slipped in the back doors of many stores and made a good haul.

An event of unusual interest in social circles occurred at Lansing last week. It was the solemnization of matrimony between Mr. John C. Shields, a well-known and prominent member of the Michigan Bar, residing in Lansing, and Miss Eleanor Stambaugh, one of the belles of Michigan's Capital.

HRAM MOORE, who recently died at Brandon, was one of the very earliest settlers of Kalamazoo county, and was a most remarkable man. He invented a harvester which, for the eight or ten years preceding 1850, harvested so many of the great wheat fields of Prairie Rouns, and was undoubtedly the earliest, as it was far the most perfect, of all the breed of reapers and harvesters that inventive skill has brought to the aid of the farmer.

One day last March, John Close, who lived by himself near the Detroit city limits, was found in his cabinet shop terribly beaten, and he died about a week after. He had been assailed by three men, who robbed him of considerable money, and left him senseless. A few days since the police arrested Frederick Sample, a marine, who confesses that he was one of the party, but that he kept watch outside while the others were busy with the old man.

MR. WM. C. DUNCAIS, of Pittsburgh, who has been deranged and missing from home for some time, was found last Friday evening in the woods near Memphis, Tenn., dead. His diamonds and money were still upon his person. He deceased was a brother of Mr. Frank H. Duncan, of Battle Creek, Mich., and also of Thomas G. Duncan, the millionaire, who died in Ireland nearly three years since. He was the contestant of the celebrated Duncan will.

The public will draw a sigh of relief at the announcement that the evidence in the Beecher-Tilton trial has been finished, and that the great scandal will soon be brought to a close. The trial of this celebrated case began on the 4th of January of this year, the case being first brought before Judge McClell, whose ruling ordering Tilton to file a bill of particulars had been reversed by Judge Neilson, to whose court, on the 5th of January, the suit was transferred.

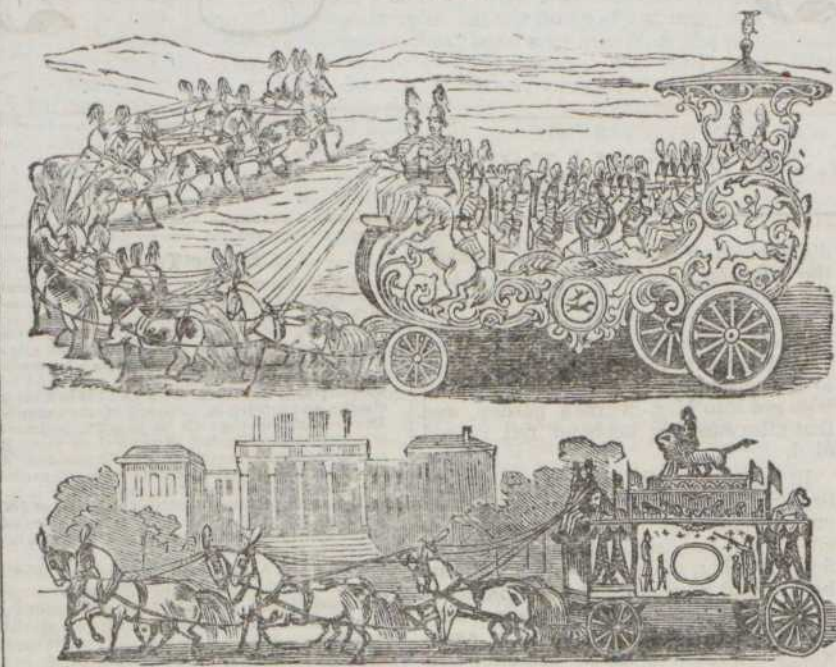
