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MICHIGAN NEWS.

Correct Copy of the Liquor Tax Law. In a former issue of our paper we printed what purported to be an exact copy of the Liquor Tax Law passed at the recent session of the Michigan Legislature...

AN ACT for the taxation of the business of manufacturing and selling spirits and intoxicating liquors...

SECTION 1. The people of the State of Michigan enact: That in all townships, cities and villages of this State there shall be annually levied and collected the sum of one cent upon the business of manufacturing, selling or keeping for sale any spirits or intoxicating liquors...

SECTION 2. Retail dealers of spirits and intoxicating liquors shall be held and deemed to include all persons who sell, give, or otherwise dispose of any such liquors...

SECTION 3. The taxes here provided for shall be assessed, levied, and collected by the same officers, and in the same time and manner as the taxes here provided for on real estate...

SECTION 4. The Assessor of every township, ward, city, or village shall, on or before the first Monday of every year, ascertain and ascertain the name of every person, corporation, association, company, partnership, or joint venture...

SECTION 5. On the first Wednesday after the third Monday in May it shall be the duty of the Assessor of every township, ward, city, or village to prepare a list of the names of all persons, corporations, associations, companies, partnerships, or joint ventures...

SECTION 6. When said Assessor has reviewed and completed the list, he shall cause to be attached thereto, signed by him, a certificate which may be in the following form: "I do hereby certify that the above named persons, corporations, associations, companies, partnerships, or joint ventures are engaged in the business of manufacturing, selling, or keeping for sale any spirits or intoxicating liquors..."

SECTION 7. In case any Assessor, County Treasurer, or Sheriff willfully neglects or refuses to perform his duty under the provisions of this act, he shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day of neglect...

SECTION 8. This act shall take effect from and after the first day of July, 1875.
