Mr. McKeon, attorney for the city of Ann Arbor, by his friend, Mr. Leitch, on behalf of the Board of Supervisors, gave his opinion in regard to the right of the city of Ann Arbor to take charge of its poor, and gave it as his opinion that the city charter does not confer the power to the city authorities to do so.
