The Republican County Convention.

In giving place to the call for the Republican County Convention, the Register said: There never was a time in the history of the Republican party when so much depended on the character of its representatives as now.

The convention was held on Wednesday and the demand of our contemporary for "men of unblemished character and clean hands" was complied with by the election of the following delegates to the State Convention: E. P. Allen, Robert Campbell, J. Webster Childs, W. H. Dell, R. A. Beal, A. J. Sawyer, George Benwick, Geo. S. Wheeler, A. D. Crane, N. S. Pines, Charles A. W. G. Palmer.

Pension Agent Sam. Post, of Ypsilanti, the man who looked himself in his office and cried over Chandler's defeat by the Democrats and the recalcitrant Republicans members of the Legislature under the lead of Hon. J. Webster Childs, was the first "hand" in the organization, and did it very handsomely.

When the convention divided into three minor conventions and recessed for fifteen minutes, to enable the districts to name their delegates to the State Convention, the great interest was concentrated in the First district, where his heart is supposed to be the seat of sympathy with it, and he allowed no man to impugn his loyalty to its principles.

THE Greenback System. This system may be briefly stated thus:—Let the Government issue a large amount—all its wants to use at least—of paper currency never to be redeemed in actual paper money. To regulate the currency regular, and accommodate the amount in circulation to the wants of business, let it be provided that any man may receive government bonds drawing interest for whatever amount he may wish to lend, or share a mortgage with it again, he exchanges his bond for greenbacks, plus the accrued interest. Money Bogs hands his millions to the Government, and the man who has the interest for them, and thus creates a scarcity. Then, as fast as he gets it lent to, or more, or rent, he gives his bonds back, and receives their interest, which must come from the people. When mortgages are paid, and his offers full of idle greenbacks again,
