He was then taken to the Beaulieu, and there he was kept in a cell, where he was treated with the greatest respect.

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CHILDREN'S Pudding.—Cut up a loaf of stale bread the day before it is required, put to soak in a pan of cold water, and when ready to mix squeeze the water through a colander, put the bread in a pan with two ounces of sifted chopped fine, two tablespoonsful of flour, some grated ginger and a little mixed spice; beat well up with a fork, mix half a pound of treacle (not golden syrup) with a little warm milk, then stir all together and boil three hours in cloth, basin or mould. This will make a large pudding much liked by children; it is cheap and wholesome.

GRAND WILD-CAT CHASE. A Bull-Terrier Fights a Wild-Cat—Defeat of the Feline. (From the Virginia Chronicle.) Yesterday afternoon the novel contest described below took place at the race course.

At about half-past 8 o'clock the track and stand were crowded with nearly 3,000 spectators, and a few minutes after the fight began. The end of the race course was enclosed by a fence, and the bull-dog made a vicious dash into the box, bringing the wild cat out hanging on to his head and nose with its claws.

For the first five minutes the fight was tolerably even, but at the end of that time the cat was so disabled that it keeled over and fought the remainder of the battle on its back and sides. The tactics of the bull-dog were rather scientific. At first he raised his front legs of good nice seed, gathering it in the middle of September. I sowed it in one corner of my garden, where the ground was rich.

THE number of swine in the country has been very much reduced within a few years, by the ravages of hog cholera in the West and Southwest; therefore it behooves farmers to take good care of their breeding sows, give them warm, dry quarters, and save and rear the pigs possible, for pork can hardly be had for the price of a few years ago.—Rural Home.

THE distance between the farmers and the fancy breeders of short-horn cattle is constantly widening. The farmers can't and won't pay the long prices asked for the best cattle of fashionable families; besides, what is perhaps of more consequence, they can and do buy good cattle, thoroughbreds, at very moderate prices. The recent sales in Iowa demonstrate the ever-increasing demand in this direction.

The knotty problem of cheap transportation, as well as the vexed question of double tracks in narrow places, is likely to have a practical solution, should the new one-rail system, which is said to be working successfully in France, where it originated, be adopted in this country.

Working Women in New York. Over 130,000 women, says an exchange, are employed in various occupations in New York, and in general at very limited wages. Few can make more than \$10 or \$12 a week, and numbers are compelled to get along on as little as \$4, while others can make no more than twenty-five cents a day. The women who worked for Stewart have been supposed to be the best cared for in the city, but this idea has since been discovered to be fallacious, since fines for every trivial shortcoming materially reduced the amount of the wages of the employes. The girls employed by Harper's are reported to be the best paid, and best cared for of any in New York.
