The Traveler's Blessing.

J. M. Farley, of Marshall, late deputy Clerk of this county, and well known to our citizens, has provided himself the traveler's benefactor by inventing a device for getting rid of the smoke and cinders which in some of the locomotive smoke stacks are a source of annoyance to all travelers by rail. Everybody knows what a disagreeable thing it is to be obliged to close the doors and windows in hot weather, in order to have one's eyes, nose, and ears filled with smoke and cinders, often proving even dangerous on account of inflammation setting in, and not infrequently causing the loss of an eye.

Mr. Farley's invention consists in attaching a horizontal sheet iron tube, about 20 inches in diameter, on the top of each car and also on the top of the locomotive, the whole being connected together when the train is made up. All motions of the cars are provided for by an elastic coupling, made on the buffer order, and intended to be used on all joints following the baggage car, the same to act in concert with an unique oscillating joint, which provides for all curves in the track—no matter how sudden or abrupt.
