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HOW TO BUILD A POULTRY HOUSE.

THE TURKO-RUSSIAN WAR. Cable dispatches announce the Russians in possession of Constantinople. The delay in signing the protocol is now explained. It gave the British an opportunity to cut the telegraph lines on the shores of the Sea of Marmora, and thus to permit the entry of the Russians into the Sultan's capital without the knowledge of the British, whose interests have given them some temporary trouble. The Russians seem to be in a position now which will enable them to remain masters of the situation, whatever the chattering diplomats of the conference may say or do.
