DEATH OF REV. DR. BRIGHAM.—It is announced by telegraph that Rev. Chas. H. Brigham, for several years a member of our state board of health and pastor of the Unitarian church at Ann Arbor, died at Brooklyn, N. Y., Feb. 19. He was a man of rare scholarship, great intellectual honesty and industry, a warm and hearty friend, active in every good work, and particularly energetic in pushing those reforms which promote human welfare and development. He was a native of Massachusetts, graduated at Harvard, had traveled extensively in the world, and his age was nearly 60 years. He was smitten with paralysis in May, 1877, and has performed no labor since that time. He was never married, but had many thousands of friends among old and young.
